Good Service Awards

For many years, The Scouts has recognised the quality of adult service. The first award of this kind – then known as the Gilt Medal of Merit – was made available by Baden-Powell in 1915. Today, Good Service Awards are presented to thank, acknowledge and celebrate outstanding members and associate members.

The Silver Wolf

This award is the unrestricted gift of the Chief Scout. It's only awarded for service of a most exceptional nature.



The Bar to the Silver Acorn

Awarded after at least five years of similarly distinguished service after receiving the Silver Acorn.



The Silver Acorn

Awarded after at least 20 years' service, which should be specially distinguished and appreciably better than outstanding.



The Bar to the Award for Merit

Awarded after at least five years of further outstanding service after receiving the Award for Merit.



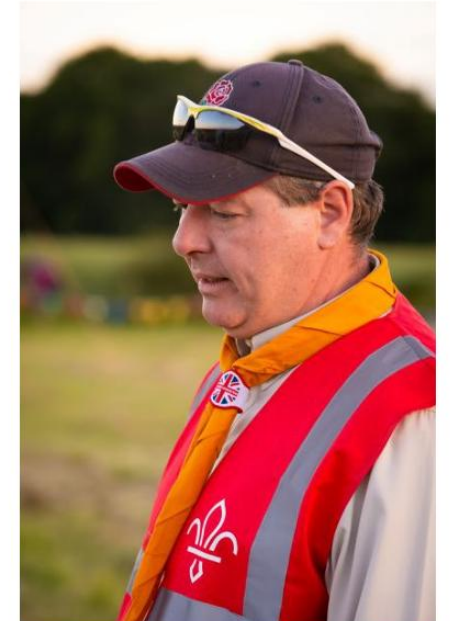
The Award for Merit

Awarded for outstanding service. It implies keen, conscientious, imaginative and dedicated service over a sustained period, of at least 12 years duration (exceptionally 10).



The Chief Scout's Commendation for Good Service

Awarded in respect of not less than 5 years good service, which stands out. It should be regarded as the Chief Scout's recognition of the very real contribution made to The Scouts by the individual concerned.



Length of Service Awards

Thanking volunteers for their continued service is important as young people in the Scouts would not have so much fun and adventure without them.

Length of Service awards are just one way the Chief Scout shows gratitude for this service at 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40, 50, 60 and 70-year intervals (based on the start and end dates of roles listed on the membership system). Service need not be continuous.



Future recognition

Do you know an inspirational volunteer who goes above and beyond what is expected of them? If you'd like to nominate someone for a **Good Service Award**, here's what you need to do:

Step 1: Determine if nominee meets the [criteria](#) for a Good Service award

Step 2: Fill out a [nomination form](#) and forward it to the relevant individual for support/approval:

District Lead Volunteers (and above) can approve the Award for Merit and the Chief Scout's Commendation for Good Service.

County/Area/Region (Scotland) Lead Volunteers (and above) can approve the Silver Acorn, Bar to the Award for Merit, Award for Merit and the Chief Scout's Commendation for Good Service.

Only the National Awards Advisory Group can approve the Silver Wolf, and the Bar to the Silver Acorn (but only once support for the nomination has been provided locally).

Step 3: Once approved and checked by UK Headquarters, awards are distributed to Counties (unless otherwise specified) on a **quarterly** basis.

Do you know a young person or volunteer whose show courage in adversity and quick thinking in the face of danger. If so, you might want to nominate them for a **Meritorious Conduct or Gallantry Award**, the **Cornwell Scout Badge** or the **Chief Scout's Personal Award**:

Step 1: Determine if nominee meets the [criteria](#) for a Meritorious Conduct/Gallantry award, the Cornwell Scout Badge or if you think they should be nominated for the Chief Scout's Personal Award.

Step 2: Fill out a [nomination form](#) and forward it to the relevant individual for support:

Only the National Awards Advisory Group can approve these awards (but only once support for the nomination has been provided locally).

Step 3: Once approved and checked by UK Headquarters, awards are distributed to Counties (unless otherwise specified) on a **bi-monthly** basis.
